Minutes of the 88th CSMC held on 23.7.2010 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (UD)

88th CSMC held on 23.7.2010 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (UD), Government of India. The list of participants is attached.

The following proposals were taken up by the CSMC:

- I. West Bengal Kolkata
- 1. Construction of Flyover between E.M. Bypass and Kazi Nazrul Islam Sarani at Ultadanga, Kolkata- Release of 4th instalment of ACA
- 2. Storm Water drainage scheme in Hooghly-Chinsurah Municipality-Release of 2nd and 3rd instalments of ACA

(The presentation made by the ULB is at Annexure –I)

The DPR for the first project was approved in August, 2006 for a total cost of Rs. 3802.00 lakhs and Central Assistance of Rs. 1330.70 lakhs and 3 instalments of ACA already released.

KMDA, the implementing agency stated that the project has achieved 83.54% physical progress and 89.92% financial progress. ULB requested for release of 4th instalment in view of good physical and financial progress made by the project.

The representative of CPWD stated that the IRMA report is too general although there are no adverse comments. There is no mention of conducting quality testing at the project site in the report. The IRMA report should contain the quality of works done, including the observations of various authorities and the compliance there on by the ULB. CPWD also stated that the duration of the project as per DPR is 18 months but the IRMA report mentioned that the implementation period has been revised to 30 months by the implementing agency. No comments are offered by IRMA on the revised implementation time. As there were no adverse comments of CPWD on project perse, the CSMC approved the release of instalments.

The DPR on the 2nd project was approved in February 2009 for total project cost of Rs. 3881.96 lakhs including Central assistance of Rs. 1358.68 lakhs and first instalment ACA amounting to Rs. 339.67 lakhs has been released. KMDA stated that the project has made 74% physical and 48%

financial progress. CPHEEO commented that IRMA report on the project is satisfactory.

It was noted that reforms are on time and there is no slippages.

CSMC approved the release of 4th instalment in respect of first project and 2nd and 3rd instalments in respect of second project as under:

II. e-Municipality in Jharkhand with Pilot in Dhanbad Municipal Council

Project rationale: The Government of Jharkhand prepared the DPR for implementation of e-governance in Dhanbad Municipal Corporation. The project will be implemented on a pilot basis in the Municipality of Dhanbad, and based on the experience of the pilot the scale up module will be formulated. Applications developed would support the municipality system and process proposed as a part of the NMMP for e-governance in Municipalities. In the first phase, the major ULBs like Dhanbad, Ranchi, Jamsedpur, Hazaribag, Deoghar will be brought under centralized e-governance umbrella. Other ULBs will be integrated with the system over the next two years in phase manner.

Implementation strategy- The State will develop a centralized solution which would facilitate delivery of 9 services to the citizens through e-governance, like Registration and issue births/deaths certificate, Property tax, utility bills, building approval, health programme, procurement and monitoring of projects, judicial management system, grievances and suggestions, etc.

Secretary (UD) directed that possibility of WiMAX of BSNL may be explored. He also advised that details of property holdings be collected without waiting for GIS and both GIS and legacy data may be used for property tax.

It was noted during the presentation made by the consultant of the ULB that the project would utilise the State Data Centre (SDC) and State Wide Area Network (SWAN) infrastructure created under NeGP. SWAN will be used as backbone to provide connectivity from the state to District and Block level of government establishment. The project would be completed in three phases so that some of the municipal services become available early.

Workshops/conference may be organized by the State to discuss the proposed software solution so that every ULB in the State may utilize it, as the software solution being proposed is State-wide. He also advised that soft skill development training should be included in the project so that the system can be run by the State on sustainable basis with out data entry operator. The State agreed to the suggestion. The SLNA representative stated that they would organize three levels of training during implementation of the project and familiarization training for all staff of ULBs, basic operations training for the system and training for back-office operations.

It was clarified by the consultant of ULB that PPP is envisaged in kiosks /citizen facilitation centre which can be extended further based on success. He clarified that System Integrator may be or may not be the BOO agency. He added that cost sharing in the project for kiosk will be on transaction basis. In

response to a query raised by the representative of DIT it was clarified by the State representative that the accounting system for revenue sharing between ULBs and SLNA is different than that of the Double Entry Accounting. DIT representative stated that use of Microsoft soft ware in the DPR contradicts technology neutral policy of GOI. It was clarified by the PMU that such an indication is for budgeting purpose only. It was decided that the RFP should have technology neutral software/hardware and name of any firm should not be mentioned.

Implementation period and Implementing agency- The pilot project would be implemented by Greater Ranchi Development Agency in one year ULB share will be provided by State government as confirmed in the meeting.

The CSMC approved the project subject to that funds will be released on signing of Tripartite Agreement by State Government/ULBs for implementation of NMMP on e-governance project is as under:

III. Uttarakhand

3. Dehradun- Revised DPR on improvement of 16 Intersections instead of 30 intersection in Dehradun City

The CSMC was informed that DPR on improvement of 30 intersections in Dehradun city was approved in the 65th meeting held on 22.1.2009 at a total cost of Rs.2943.00 lakh with ACA of Rs.2354.40 lakh and Central assistance amounting to Rs.588.60 lakh released as first instalment. The State Govt. has submitted a revised DPR proposing changing in the scope of project by reducing number of intersections from 30 to 16 with revised cost of Rs.2757.91 lakh. The ULB clarified that the changes in the project has been necessary mainly because no provision was made in the cost estimates of the approved DPR for rehabilitation/compensation for land acquisition. The provision has been made in the revised DPR for Rehabilitation/compensation of land at an estimated cost of Rs.1169.92 lakh. Both CPWD and UT Division have technically approved the revised DPR for improvement of 16 junctions at an estimated cost of Rs.2757.91 lakh.

JS & FA observed that in the CSMC meeting on 19.6.09 when the original DPR was discussed, the State had indicated that land requirement of the project is minimal as most of the land belong to the State.

Additional secretary(UD), Govt. of Uttarakhand also stated that by executing the work on only 16 nos. intersections against 30 nos. intersections as proposed earlier, there will not be any adverse effect on the deliverables of the project.

Secretary (UD) observed that since the State had given a categorical statement to the CSMC that there was no land related issues, they have to clarify the reason that led to the current compulsion requiring acquisition of land.

The CSMC decided that the State should provide adequate justification regarding the necessity for acquisition of land and rehabilitation cost for consideration of revised DPR.

4. Haridwar- Revised DPR on improvement of 12 junctions in Haridwar city instead of 16 junctions

The DPR on improvement of 16 junctions in Haridwar was approved by CSMC in its 63rd meeting held on 29.12.2008 at a total cost of Rs.2005.00 lakh with ACA of Rs.1604.10 lakh and Central Share released Rs.320.80 lakh.

The ULB has submitted a revised DPR reducing number of junctions from 16 to 12 with revised cost of Rs.1765.50 lakh. The ULB clarified that out of 16 junctions initially approved, 4 numbers of junctions namely, Shiv Chowk, Arya Nagar Chowk, Chandracharya Chowk, Delhi-Niti bypass and Karach Road Junction are not being considered for improvement. Out of the said four intersections, work of improvement on three intersections, namely, Shiv Chowk, Arya Nagar Chowk, Chandracharya Chowk has already been done. The provision for the fourth junction has been included in the proposed Jwalapur Railway Over bridge work to be constructed under the stimulus package of Government of India. Rs.3.3 cr. has been included for the revised DPR for acquisition of land/building that was not envisaged in the original DPR approved by CSMC.

Both CPWD and UT Division have technically appraised the revised DPR for Rs.1765.57 lakh.

The CSMC observed that at the time approval of original DPR the State Govt. had indicated that there was no land related issue and that the land is owned by the Govt. The CSMC decided that the State should provide adequate justification regarding the necessity for acquisition of land and rehabilitation cost for consideration of revised DPR.

IV.Andhra Pradesh

Hyderabad- Dropping of DPR relating to comprehensive Energy audit for pumping station under Distribution Network of Hyderabad Metropolitan Water Supply and Sewerage Board.

The CSMC noted that the DPR on Comprehensive Energy audit for pumping station under Distribution Network of Hyderabad was placed before the 39th meeting held on 6.12.2007 for consideration. The proposal was deferred by CSMC subject to clarification on the observation made by CSMC. Even after long pursuance the State Govt. has failed to provide the desired clarification sought by the CSMC. In the meanwhile 7 years allocation for Andhra Pradesh and additional allocations for mission city of Hyderabad have exhausted. The CSMC decided to drop the project.

V. Re-imbursement of PMU cost

Assam -The PMU for Assam was approved by CSMC in 73rd meeting held on 29.5.2009 at a total cost of Rs.75.84 lakh for 3 years i.e. Rs.25.28 lakh per annum. The GMDA has submitted a claim of Rs.12.58 lakh for first 6 months. As per PMU tool kit State can claim re-imbursement for PMU expenditure average 6 months to be paid in advance. As the claim submitted by the State within the permissible limit, the CSMC approved release of Rs.12.58 lakh for first 6 months of the year.

Uttar Pradesh- The Mission Directorate stated that the proposal for setting up of PMU in Uttar Pradesh was approved by CSMC for annual cost of Rs. 64.8 lakhs per annum in the 39th meeting held on 6.12.07 which was enhanced to Rs. 77.00 lakhs per annum by the 67th CSMC held 6.2.09 to include cost of support staff and equipment.

The CSMC noted that Rs. 12,36,022 has been released towards expenditure for PMU for the period April – September of the FY 2009-10. The State has submitted another claim of Rs. 16,65,064 for the period October—March. Since the total amount is within annual ceiling, the CSMC decided to release Rs. 16,65,064 incurred as PMU expenditure by the State during the period October- March, 2009-10.

Minutes of the 89th CSMC held on 20.8.2010

The 89th CSMC was held on 20.8.2010 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (UD), Government of India. The list of participants is attached.

The CSMC took up the following proposals:

1. Uttar Pradesh Statewide Computerized Administration of Local Entities (UPSCALE)

(Presentation made by the ULB is annexed)

The DPR on **Uttar Pradesh Statewide Computerized Administration of Local Entities (UPSCALE)** aims to implement a Unified State-wide e-Governance Framework (USGF) for the State of Uttar Pradesh. The Kanpur Nagar Nigam will be selected local body and be the first subscriber of the project. Other the mission cities will follow Kanpur in the next phase as subscriber, and all other local bodies in the state will become the subscribers in course of time. The solution is designed to provide workflow, flexibility and scalability to handle these phases.

The USGF will be deployed centrally at State Data Centre which will act as e-Governance service platform to provide services to the citizens. The application will be deployed at the State Data Centre accessed using the SWAN by all ULBs.

On being enquired by the Secretary(UD), the State informed that SDC is yet be set in the State, and the application will be deployed through a third party data centre, until SDC is set up.

The consultant to the SLNA stated that studies were conducted by IIT, Kanpur in the selected ULBs to find out the current level of services, process variations, review technology innovations to determine the best fit matrix incorporating the present scenario, project objectives and technology in the DPR. The JNNURM guidelines on e-governance in Municipalities issued on August 2009 has been followed in the preparation of DPR. Applications will be developed to support the service levels and process reforms as part of NMMP for e-governance by adopting appropriate solution software modules to facilitate the delivery of services to the citizens like birth and death certifications, property tax, water tax, building plan approval, procurement and project monitoring, health module, real estates management, license, etc.

Secretary (UD) observed that leased lines should be used for horizontal connectivity to all ULB offices. The idea should be to provide services to all public by deploying collective applications. There should be a continuous process of application modification to provide best services to the citizens through well designed strategy and streamlining the process.

Representative of Department of Information Technology(DIT) opined that the DPR should have provided details of the future processes that should be adopted. He also stated that the aspect of user satisfaction is lacking in the DPR and, perhaps, the design exercise has not included citizens response and needs. The DPR should precisely describe the process for developing the application. He also suggested that citing of particular proprietary software in the DPR should be avoided as alternate suitable software are available in the market and that the software should be vendor neutral.

The consultant of the SLNA stated that software are indicated to arrive at the budgetary prices and no specific software will be indicated in the tender. Representative of DIT stated that since state wide roll out will be involved, procurement of the software should be through tendering.

On the long implementation period indicated in the DPR, Secretary (UD) stated that some tasks may be undertaken simultaneously to reduce the implementation cycle. Tasks like deployment of State Implementation Consultant (SIC) may be expedited to ensure reduction in system study phase necessary to arrive at the optimal processes in the State for each of the service area.

The representative of DIT stated that the business process reengineering (BPR) should be carried out at the DPR stage itself. He also stated that Impact studies of some services where e-governance has been implemented have shown that the citizen have not been generally satisfied with the quality of service provided after e-governance and that perhaps citizen consultations had not been carried out. Advisor, Planning Commission opined that citizen response is very important and that should be properly studied. Secretary (UD) stated that BPR should be done by the agency implementing the e-governance and that the processes of one ULB do not vary from those of another one. JS(M) stated that the agency can study one Municipal Corporation, one Municipality or Municipal Council and one Nagar Panchayat and then carry out the BPR.

The Consultant of ULB/SLNA submitted that there is a substantial variation in the proposed cost and the cost appraised by PMU. They clarified that the original estimates of Rs. 67.99 cr. was arrived after taking into consideration of various components of the project. Therefore, the recommended cost at Rs.28.07 cr. may not be sufficient for the implementation of the project for achieving its goal. The ULB requested the CSMC to reconsider the cost.

PMU stated that they have examined the cost of the project methodically and the calculations have been carried out taking into account the actual need of the project and are in line with prevailing norms in the industry. Representative from DIT also suggested that based on their experience with other e-governance projects, typical soft ware development cost is about 5-6% of the total cost. It was also indicated by DIT that the appraisal note from PMU is detailed and consider that the costs of certain components of the project were on the higher side which have been reviewed by PMU and revised down to reasonable level.

JS (M) observed that even the appraised cost at Rs.28.07 cr. appears to be on higher side particularly the funds earmarked for capacity building. It was also indicated that the admissibility of certain costs towards GIS and GPRS tracking device under JNNNURM may also be relooked at as per NMMP guidelines.

Secretary (UD) directed that the cost of various components indicated in the appraisal note and its admissibility be vetted by DIT in view of above observation in consultation with the ULB/SLNA and PMU. CSMC approved the project subject to vetting of costs by DIT which will taken as the approved cost of the project.

2. Re-imbursement of PIU cost for Uttar Pradesh

The team leader PMU, Uttar Pradesh submitted that the reimbursement claims of Rs.47,82,758/- forwarded by SLNA is the actual cost incurred by the State and within the approved annual ceiling.

The CSMC approved release of Rs.47,82,758/- towards the cost incurred by the State on PIU during 2008-09 and 2009-10.

3. Provision for release of 25% of fee payable to IRMA as advance

The Govt. of Madhya Pradesh has submitted a proposal to Mission Directorate asking for advance payment upto 25% of the approved cost for IRMA as the State Govt. has no funds for payment to the agency appointed as IRMA.

The Mission Directorate informed the CSMC that as per existing toolkit, the expenditure of IRMA appointed by the States with the approval of CSMC, will be reimbursed on submission of claims by the SLNAs based on actual payments. A proposal was submitted to the CSMC for consideration and approval for payment of 25% of approved cost for IRMA as advance and modification of the guidelines for providing for advance payment. The CSMC had decided that Mission Directorate may examine the proposal in details after obtaining the comments of concerned authorities before submitting the proposal to CSMC for final decision. Accordingly, comments of other members of CSMC were sought. CPHEEO, Ministry of HUPA and TCPO have conveyed their no objection with regard to the advance payment of IRMA. However, Ministry of Finance has not supported the proposal.

Adviser, Planning Commission stated that prima-facie, there should not be any objection for advance payment to the extent of 25% of the approved cost for IRMA since this practice is already being followed for PIU.

After the discussion, CSMC decided that a fresh reference may be made to Ministry of Finance clarifying the need for making advance payments towards the cost of IRMA.

4. Withdrawal of Project "Storm water Drainage for Bahini & Noonmati Basin at Guwahati" Assam

The Project titled "Storm Water Drainage for Bahini and Noonmati Basin" at Guwahati was approved by CSMC in its 76th meeting held on 28.8.2009 at a total cost of Rs. 12536.00 lakh with Additional Central Assistance (ACA) of Rs. 9000.00 lakh under the additional allocation provided by Planning Commission vide O.M. Dated 24.12.2008.

With the approval of UDM, Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance was requested on 29.9.2009 to release 1st installment of ACA. However, Department of Expenditure turned down the proposal on the ground that the State of Assam has exhausted its allocation. The matter was again considered by CSMC in its 86th meeting held on 21.5.10 and it was decided that matter may be taken up with Ministry of Finance again to reconsider their decision regarding release of funds.

Accordingly, Ministry of Finance was again requested to release the funds for the project. Ministry of Finance vide note dated 9.7.10 has reiterated their earlier decision not to concur with the proposal inter alia on the grounds that the State of Assam has already exceeded its 7 years allocation including the additional allocation of Rs. 100.00 crore recommended by the Planning Commission vide O.M. dated 24.12.2008.

The CSMC decided to withdraw its approval for the project and drop the same from the list of approved project in view of the stand taken by Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance not to release funds for the project.

5. Withdrawal of Project on "Water Supply project" of Naya Raipur", Chhattisgarh.

The Project titled "Water Supply project for Naya Raipur", Chhattisgarh was approved by CSMC in its 68th meeting held on 13.2.09 at a total cost of Rs. 15623.00 lakh with Additional Central Assistance (ACA) of Rs. 10000.00 lakh under additional allocation provided vide Planning Commission's O.M. Dated 24.12.2008.

After obtaining the approval of UDM, Ministry of Finance, Department of Expenditure was requested to release 1st installment of ACA for the project. However, Department of Expenditure turned down the proposal to release funds on the ground that Chhattisgarh has already exhausted its 7 year allocation including the additional allocation provided by Planning Commission's O.M. dated 24.12.08.

The matter was again considered by CSMC in its 86th meeting held on 21.5.10 wherein it was decided that the case may be taken up again with Ministry of Finance to reconsider release of funds for the project. Accordingly, Ministry of Finance was again requested to release the fund. Ministry of Finance has reiterated their earlier stand not to concur with the proposal.

The CSMC decided to withdraw its approval for the project and the same from the list of approved project in view of the stand taken by Department of Expenditure, Ministry of Finance not to release funds for the project.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

Justifying the request, the city officials had mentioned that Semi Low Floor (860mm/900mm floor height) buses are financially viable for Bhopal city because the prospective bidders do not find Low Floor (400mm) AC/ Non AC buses and SLF (650mm) buses financially viable in totality due to higher initial upfront payment and operating & maintenance cost. Furthermore for their BRTS, BMC is now planning for 900mm floor height bus stations with 900mm floor height buses to have level boarding and alighting.

OSD (UT) said that the present proposal seems to be more sustainable and economical as the cost of Semi Low Floor buses (650mm) would be lesser than that of Low Floor buses. CSMC approved the request to change the category subject to the following conditions:-

- a. Level boarding and alighting will be ensured on BRTS corridor.
- b. The total cost of the buses as per the revised proposal along with all ITS compliments would not exceed the amount already approved. The cost shall however, be finalised at the stage of 2nd instalment.

2. Jaipur – Change in Category of Buses Sanctioned for BRTS

In the CSMC meeting held on 20.02.2009, the buses were sanctioned for Jaipur as per following details:

The city official mentioned in their proposal that they have been successfully operating 220 Semi Low Floor Non AC (650 mm) buses received from the manufacturers on the city roads. On the basis of the experience gained, it transpires that Semi Low Floor buses are best suited for a city like Jaipur.

The city official requested that of the 80 Low Floor AC buses sanctioned, 60 may be converted to Semi Low Floor Non AC while 20 Low Floor AC buses may be retained.

After detailed discussions, the CSMC decided that the justification provided by Govt. of Rajasthan/ city official regarding change in category of buses from AC to Non AC etc is not convincing especially in view of the fact that it is a major tourist destination and fast growing city aspiring to have a metro. As such it was decided to return the proposal for reconsideration.

Minutes of 90th CSMC under JNNURM held on 23.9.2010 under the chairmanship of Secretary(UD), Government of India

The 90th CSMC was held on 23.9.2010 under the chairmanship of Secretary (UD), Government of India. The list of participants is annexed.

The CSMC considered the following proposals:

I. West Bengal, Kolkata

1. 24X7 Water Supply Scheme for Panihati Municipality, Kolkata UA.

(Presentation made by the ULB is at Annexure I).

- **2. Project Rationale:** Panihati Municipality is one of the ULBs of Kolkata Urban Development Area consisting of 35 Wards. The present water supply to the Municipality is mainly ground water from Deep-tube wells and some quantity of treated surface water from Water Treatment Plant at Baranagar. The water supply distribution system in Panihati is more than 40 years old comprises mostly of AC &CI material pipes. These pipelines have deteriorated and are now beyond their useful service life. The UFW is estimated as 35 to 40%, above the 15% as per norms.
- 3. The present daily supply is about 27.88 MLD for an estimated present population of about 381850. The per capita water availability is 47.46 lpcd considering 35% system losses against the required norm of 135 lpcd to be delivered. Only 53% households have direct connections and rest are catered through public stand posts. The duration of supply is 7 hrs. a day intermittently. The population is forced to depend upon untreated local sources of water such as ponds, river and private tube wells for fulfilling their remaining needs of water supply.
- 4. To mitigate the shortage of water, Panihati Municipality has prepared a Detailed Project Report for providing comprehensive water supply system with the required infrastructure for the conveyance, pumping, storage and distribution for the entire area covering all 35 wards, achieving 100% household connectivity and 24x7 service pattern.
- **5. Project objectives:** The proposed DPR aims to ensure adequate potable water supply as per norms for the entire population of all 35 wards of Panihati Municipality achieving 100% household connectivity and a supply pattern of 24x7, reduce UFW/NRW by replacing the old & leaky pipes and conveyance pipes, provide comprehensive water metering system to ensure sustainability of the water project and incentivize conservation of water.

- **6. Project components**: The following are the major works to be executed under the proposed DPR:
- 7. Raw water intake jetty, Pump House, Raw water Rising Main, Construction of WTP including CWR sub-stations, Primary Feeder Mains, RCC Overhead Service Reservoirs, Water Supply Distribution System, Providing bulk and consumer water meters, underground reservoir and electro-mechanical equipments.
- **8. Implementing agency and implementation period:** The project will be implemented by KMDA and handed over to the Municipality after completion. The completion period is 16 months from October, 2010 to March, 2012.
- **9. CSMC observations**: On being enquired by Secretary (UD), ULB stated that the project will cover un-served households of the existing area as well as new areas so that the entire municipal area gets full supply of water on 24x7 basis.
- 10. In response to a query by JS (M) regarding the integration of BSUP with the project, the ULB stated that there are around 1.25 lakh slum population including minority/ and non-minority population in the project area. All BPL population will be provided water connections and the ULB will provide gross subsidy/grant for supply of water. The project will cover 62,00 minority population also. They further clarified that pumping system has been designed to measure supply of water to BPL area on volumetric metering.
- 11. Senior Adviser, Planning Commission desired clarifications from ULB as to why it is necessary to provide 24x7 water supply when the population do not use water all the time. There should be slab system instead of 24 hrs. running water to check misuse of water. It was clarified that provision of 24x7 water supply has to be as per the guidelines provided in the Manual of Water Supply and Water Treatment issued by the Ministry of Urban Development. The 24x7 provision is cost effective as well as sustainable.
- 12. CPHEEO stated that the project is technically sound. However, the ULB should set up an appropriate institutional mechanism to measure and regulate the water supply through bulk metering at strategic locations as well, facilitate regular water audit, mitigate leakage, regulate water use that is to be provided on subsidized rates/free to the BPL people to check misuse of water and generate correct revenues for sustainability of the project. Secretary (UD) suggested that metering may also be provided for BPL households even if the cost of water is borne by the ULB. There should be a mechanism for measuring the demand of water by BPL and to dissuade people from misusing the water. The representative of the State Govt. committed that the ULB will find a reasonable cap and implement that for poors. Over and above that cap,

The poors will be charged for water. The State Government further stated that they will link the DPR under preparation and drainage and treatment of waste water to reduce the demand for water. Secretary (UD) stated that these should be conditions for the sanction of this DPR.

- **13. Status of Reforms**: It was noted that implementation of reforms in the State and ULBs are on course. The repeal of ULCRA is the only area of concern. KMDA clarified that the Expert Committee has submitted the report which is under examination of the State Govt. This reform is targeted for completion by 2010-11.
- 14. Dir(PF), Ministry of Finance stated that the project has to be completed by 31 March, 2012 which is the terminal date of the Mission. He enquired whether the procurement process has been initiated. The ULB stated that the tender is ready and will be issued immediately after the DPR has been approved by the CSMC.
- 15. The CSMC approved the project subject to the above observations and conditionalities of CPHEEO indicated in the appraisal note as well as during the meeting and those contained in para 12 above as under:

Minutes of the 91st CSMC for UIG component of JNNURM held on 12.11.2010

The 91st CSMC was held on 12.11.2010 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (UD), Government of India. The list of participants is annexed.

The CSMC considered the following proposals:

I. West Bengal

1. Construction of Flyover at Eastern Railway Main Line along with Approach Road, Chandannagar

(Presentation made by the ULB is at Annexure-I)

Project Rationale: The ULB stated that Chandannagar is not well connected to the National Highway running nearby the city, the age old GT Road has become highly congested. The growth of Chandannagar city has been greatly restricted on the East of River Saraswati. The Eastern area has been suffering from high density and congestion and there is little scope for further growth. On the other hand the West of River Saraswati is relatively sparsely populated and has available significant tracts of lands for further growth. Further the River Saraswati and the railway track has been significant obstacles to the connectivity between the two regions causing uneven growth of the two areas of the city.

The proposed project aims to provide critical connectivity of the city to the nearest National Highways (NH-2) and shall provide decongestion of the GT Road running through the city. The project will not only change but enhance the socio-economic scenario of the region but also increase the mobility of the present urban population inhabiting along this corridor.

Project Components: The project comprises of the following main components:

- a) Construction of two lane (two-way) metallic road for the project corridor with NMV lane having 2 m wide Cycle Track and 1.50 m wide footpath on both side of the carriageway;
- b) Construction of 2 Lane Bridge (No.1) over River Saraswati with 7 mtrs. NMV lane having Cycle Track and footpath on both side of the carriageway.
- c) Construction of 2 lane new(two way) Road on embankment parallel to River Saraswati
- d) Construction of 2 Lane (two way) Elevated corridor of length approximately 650 m consisting of Bridge(No. 2) over River Saraswati, Road over Bridge (ROB) over Eastern Railway main line (Howrah-Bandel Section) and the balance viaduct portion of carriageway.

Issues Noted:

OSD (UT) observed that arrangements for pumping of water for the existing road under bridge should be done simultaneously along with the implementation of the project. The road characteristics of approach road and provisions for pumping of water should be provided before the release of 2nd instalment.

KMDA stated that water pumping will be maintained by the ULB. There is an existing bridge which will be used for pedestrians, and ROB will be used for buses and other vehicles. The details sought by OSD (UT) will be provided before coming for release of 2nd instalment.

CPWD observed that the project could be covered by only one bridge instead of two bridges proposed over one river by proper alignment. ULB stated that two bridges have been proposed due to paucity of lands, and single over bridge will require larger space for crossing the river twice. The construction of two over bridges has been designed in such a manner that there is no land problem.

On being asked by Secretary (UD), ULB stated that the total length of bridge would be 3.42 km. (approx.). KMDA also stated that Eastern Railway has been approached to accord no objection for construction of ROB over Eastern Railway main line in Howrah-Bandel Section, and there will be no problem in getting the approval of Railway authorities.

Project implementation period and Implementing Agency: The project will be implemented by Chanannagar Municipal Corporation in 24 months.

Secretary (UD) observed that there is a risk of funds release if the project is not completed by 31.3.2012, and the ULB should ensure that the project is completed by 31.3.2012. The ULB stated that the project will be completed by 31.3.2012, tender documents for the project are ready and the process for various approvals already initiated. The project will claim last instalment of ACA before 31.3.2012.

The CSMC approved the project subject to above conditions and the conditionalities indicated by the appraisal agencies in the appraisal notes as detailed below:

2. Barrackpore-Kalyani-Dum Dum Expressway Road Project within KMA

(Presentation made by the ULB is at Annexure-II)

Project Rationale: KMDA stated that one of the most important growth centres identified by the Kolkata Metropolitan Planning Committee is Kalyani-Gayeshpur area situated in the east bank of KMA. The proposed Barrackpore-Kalyani Expressway corridor has emerged as a major planning tool in directing the growth in Kolkata Metropolitan Area and is basically a Trans-municipal Major Arterial/Trunk Road passes through over eight Municipalities such as Dum Dum, Khardah, Bhatpara, Titagarh, Halisahar, North Barrackpore, Kanchrapara & Kalyani etc. At present, Kalyani bound traffic has to travel through congested areas of various municipalities. The traffic coming from North Bengal enters the KMA through NH-34 running through the towns of Barasat. Madhyamgram, etc. which are extremely congested. Due to congestion of traffic, a large number of vehicles remain stranded on the NH-34 causing further congestions.

The proposed Barrackpore- Kalyani-Dum Dum Expressway will provide an alternative to north-south corridor bypassing congested BT road and also be a vital link between the four National Highways NH-34/NH-35 and NH-2/NH-6 through Belgharia Expressway and Second Vivekanand Bridge across River Hoogly. The project will greatly change the socio-economic scenario of the region and also increase the mobility of the present urban population inhabiting along this corridor.

Project components: The project comprises of the following works:

- a) Strengthening of existing carriageway and widening of existing 7 m carriageway to 4 Lane Road (with two separate 2 lane road) along with Service Road, Cycle Track and Footpath;
- b) Construction of separate Box Culverts for widened carriageway along 64 nos. existing box culverts
- c) Construction of 2 Lane Bridge for widened carriageway along existing four nos. minor bridges
- d) Construction of 2 Lane ROB with approach viaduct for widened carriageway along existing one no. ROB;
- e) Improvement of Drainage
- f) Development of Traffic Appurtenances and other items.

Implementing agency and implementation period:

The implementing agency will be KMDA and the project will be completed by 31.3.2012.

On being asked by the Secretary (UD), the ULB stated the all action will be taken to ensure that the project is completed by 31.3.2012.

Issues Noted:

OSD (UT) observed that in view of heavy traffic of public transport, there is a strong requirement of dedicated /demarcated bus lane in order to meet future demands. Design and requirement of pedestrian crossings need to be provided before release of 2nd instalment. The State also needs to confirm that no land acquisition is required for the project. The slow moving traffic i.e. pedestrian and cycles need to be physically segregated from expressway to reduce fatalities. OSD(UT) also observed that in view of future traffic requirements, widening of the expressway is required. However, the DPR does not provide details of existing and future land use pattern and future development activities that is considered for the stretch.

KMDA and ULB stated that land is available and there are no environmental issues. The service road is already existing which will be separated from the expressway.

The CSMC approved the project subject to above observations and conditionalities indicated by the appraisal agencies in their appraisal note as detailed below:

3. Elevated Corridor from Kestopur to Jora Mandir on Kazi Narul Islam Avenue

(Presentation made by the ULB is at Annexure-III)

Project Rationale: The ULB stated that Kazi Narul Islam Avenue is one of the major arterial roads of Kolkata providing critical connectivity to the Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose International Airport with the north and southern parts of Kolkata. It starts at Ultadanga in the city core and ends near the airport, having total length of about 8 km. This corridor is the main link road for the traffic entering the city as well as going to NH-2 or NH-6 (via Belgharia Expressway) as well as going to NH-34, NH35 from northern side of Kolkata, thereby catering to the significant quantum of through traffic using this road.

Over the years, massive ribbon development comprising of residential, commercial and institutional buildings have come up along this corridor generating a huge volume of local traffic and significant cross traffic along this corridor, thereby resulting massive congestion and vehicles-pedestrians conflict. The proposed DPR aims to segregate the through traffic from local traffic by providing of two tiers of carriageway with the upper tier as elevated corridor to cater to the through traffic and the lower tier which will be existing carriageway with necessary improvements to cater to the local traffic with provision of service roads and facilities for non motorized traffic and footpath for pedestrians. Three pedestrian subways have been proposed at Kestopur, Baguihati and Jora Mandir keeping in view the present pedestrians and vehicles conflict.

Project components: The project comprises of the following components:

- a) Construction of 4 lance elevated corridor for through traffic with a provision of 3 lance carriageway service road, cycle track and footpath, total length of elevated corridor with viaduct.
- b) Provision for 3 nos. pedestrian subways at Kestopur, Baguihati and Jora Mandir.
- c) Improvement of existing carriageway including provision of 3 lane carriageway
- d) Construction of longitudinal PCC drain on both side of the road and connected with the existing CD structure for the smooth passage of storm water.
- e) Widening of four nos. culverts.

Implementing agency and implementation period: Project will be implemented by State Public Works Department (Roads) and will be responsible for O&M. The project will be completed by March, 2012.

Issues Noted:

(i) OSD (UT) stated that during sanctioning of Bus Rapid Transport project from Ultadanga to Garia, the State had committed that the BRTS in Phase-II will be extended from Ultadanga to airport with state funding if Central assistance is not available. The current corridor connects to the airport at one end which is one of the major nodes. Therefore, extension of BRTS corridor from Ultadanga to airport should be taken up as part of this project in order to ease the traffic congestion and promote public transport. Approval of the design of at grade BRTS Corridor in this stretch should be taken up before release of 2nd installment. KMDA stated that the BRTS from Ultadanga to Garia will be extended to airport as promised by the State.

- ii) OSD (UT) further stated that the design and requirement of pedestrian crossings at various locations should be looked into. The road re-engineering should be done at the time of implementation and it should be examined if the depth of pedestrians subways can be reduced say by 1½ meter and elevate the road slightly.
- iii) The matter relating to 3 nos. pedestrian subways was discussed. The State Government argued that pedestrian subways are absolutely essential and there is heavy public demand for same. Alternative suggestions of UT division for substitution of pedestrian crossings will not be acceptable to public. UT Division agreed that grade separated pedestrian crossings should be provided with about 1½ m depth and elevating the road by about 1½ m. It may also be examined if the flyover is required to have a vertical clearance of 5.5.m at each crossing as per National Highway standards.
- iv) Secretary (UD) observed that during construction precautions should be taken to divert traffic to avoid any casualty. The ULB stated that service road will be constructed first for diversion of traffic for which land is available.
- v) JS (Mission) stated that SLSC approvals for the three new projects considered by the CSMC should be conveyed to Mission Directorate before release of 1st installment.
- vi) CSMC approved the project subject to above conditionalities and the conditionalties indicated by the appraisal agencies in the appraisal notes as detailed below:

Regarding vouchers/receipts of expenditure for PMU / PIU, the CSMC decided that as the copies of such vouchers are forwarded by the State Government, Mission Directorate may accept these clear photocopies without insisting for originals or attestation of each voucher.

II. Madhya Pradesh

Indore - Riverside Corridor of Indore BRTS

(Presentation made by the ULB at Annexure-IV)

It was noted that the DPR for Riverside corridor or BRTS, Indore has been appraised by CPWD for Rs.28415.00 lakh which will require Central commitment of Rs.14207.50 lakh. However, there is only Rs.9000.00 lakh balance for Indore against additional allocation. Due to paucity of funds, the Municipal Corporation of Indore proposed to implement the project in two phases and the cost of first phase would be Rs.180 crore with Central Assistance of Rs.90 crore.

The DPR was discussed in the 81st CSMC held on 22.01.2010 and the CSMC decided to defer the proposal till the State Government submit road map for implementation of Pilot BRTS sanctioned under JNNURM in August, 2006. The State Government vide letter dated 24.02.2010 provided the status of the Pilot BRTS and indicated that the Pilot BRTS shall be completed by 31st October, 2010.

The DPR was again discussed by the 86th CSMC held on 25.05.2010 and the CSMC decided that the DPR can be considered only in the State Government confirms that IMC will implement the 2nd phase from its own resources without any Central Assistance.

IMC vide letter dated 10.11.10 and Principal Secretary (UD), Government of Madhya Pradesh vide letter dated 11.11.10 requested that Phase-I of the project costing Rs.180 crore may be approved under JNNURM and the construction of remaining activities will be taken up concurrently from the Municipal fund as per break up given below:

12 nos. bridges along the corridor on nala /drain
 Construction of 4 new bridges
 Street lighting and electrification works
 Remaining foot bridges
 ITS, PIS and TIC component (under GEF)
 Rs. 9.19 cr.
 Rs. 10.23 cr

Total: Rs.60.93 Cr.

The Municipal Corporation Indore has also submitted that the remaining components costing Rs.43.26 crore shall be executed by the Corporation at a later stage as and when funds are available.

Issues Noted:

OSD(UT) stated that seven corridors have been identified for developing BRTS within the Indore city, which can be developed in phases. While sanctioning the Pilot BRTS on AB Road in Indore by CSMC under JNNURM, the seven identified corridors were projected by the city and would be part of the BRTS. Out of these seven corridors the Pilot AB Road corridor of 11.65 km sanctioned earlier and presently under execution and is expected to be completed by March 2011. The current DPR for Riverside corridor would run right through the middle of the city and would be exclusively for BRT buses, cycles and pedestrians, and hence would be a catalyst for effective modal shift in favour of public transport and NMT.

OSD (UT) supported the implementation action of the DPR in two phases subject to the following conditions:

1. Work on Phase-II (Sub-Phase 1) should also be taken up simultaneously so as to be completed with phase I. The release of last instalment of Central funds for phase I shall be conditional to completion of phase II (sub phase-I) by IMC from its own funds, in case no additional funds are made available under JNNURM. The work of sub phase-II of phase-II amounting to Rs.43.26 crore may be done subsequently by IMC through its budgetary resources,

2. IMC should explore the possibility of densification of land along the corridor,

- 3. The densification should be done on all BRT corridors and local body/State Government should take up steps for increasing the FAR on all feeder and BRT corridors to at least 2.5 to 3,
- 4. The city should adopt a proper parking policy in line with the NUTP,

5. Action to be taken to set up UMTA,

6. A Dedicated Urban Trust Fund should be set up at city and state level,

7. The city should adopt a proper advertisement policy, bring advertisement only on public transport, intermediate public transport, public utilities and street furniture.

Secretary (UD) observed that the project should be completed by 31.3.2012.

The CSMC approved the project subject to above conditions conditionalities indicated by the appraisal agencies in the appraisal notes as detailed below:

CSMC noted that the 5 projects were approved in the 66th CSMC held on 30.1.2009 regarding comprehensive sewerage schemes in five Town Panchayats in the city of Chennai at a total cost of Rs.212.76 crore with admissible ACA of Rs.74.47 crore as detailed below:

Out of the total Central commitment of Rs.7447.00 lakhs, Rs.1860.00 lakhs has been released as ACA.

TUFIDCO, the SLNA for Tamil Nadu clarified that the implementation of these projects have become problematic as the lands for sewerage treatment plants are not available, and due to non-availability of land, objection etc. the Govt. of Tamil Nadu has cancelled administrative sanction already issued. The Govt. of Tamil Nadu has submitted additional projects and will be submitting further projects in place five projects being dropped which may be taken up from the balance ACA committed in the above five projects.

CSMC approved the withdrawal of the above mentioned 5 projects and decided that the amount of Rs.1860.00 lakh already released for the 5 projects will be returned by the Govt. of Tamil Nadu along with interest to be worked out by Ministry of Finance. CSMC further decided that the balance ACA available for sanctioning new projects as a result of withdrawal of the 5 projects may be examined on file taking into account the amount to be deducted for capacity building.

2. Chennai: Solid Waste Management of Chennai

The project on Solid Waste Management of Chennai was approved by CSMC in its 21st meeting held on 2.2.2007 at a total cost of Rs.25532.00 lakh with admissible ACA of Rs.8936.00 lakh. The project consists of the following three components:

- a) Upgradation of collection system by purchasing and deployment of tricycles and bins for Door Step collection of garbage and purchase of haulage vehicles.
- b) Modernization of Transfer Station 6 Nos. with equipment
- c) Creation of waste processing facilities with infrastructure and construction of sanitary landfills

SLNA, Tamil Nadu vide letter dated 7.8.2009 informed that Chennai Corporation has decided to implement the project through PPP for which no additional funds/remaining ACA instalment is required. SLNA has forwarded a revised proposal for changing the mode implementation of the component (c) through PPP with the revised cost of Rs.3647.58 lakh, and the required ACA would now be Rs.1276.64 lakh.

CPHEEO observed that the equipments in respect of components (a) and (b) have been purchased. However, it is not clear whether the parties for implementing the component (c) on PPP basis has been identified or not, and also environmental clearances have not been obtained yet.

TUFIDCO stated that parties for implementing the component (c) on PPP have been identified. As regards the environmental clearances, the same is expected to be received soon. TUFIDCO mentioned that the Govt. of Tamil Nadu has submitted additional projects in lieu and will be submitting further projects, which may be taken up against the balance ACA that will be available in view of the reduced ACA commitment required for the revised DPR.

It was noted that as per the revised project cost of Rs.3647.58 lakh and the Central share of Rs.1276.64 lakh, the first instalment would be Rs. 319.16 lakhs. Accordingly, the Govt. Tamil Nadu will have to return Rs. 1914.84 cr. along with interest which will be worked out by Ministry of Finance.

The CSMC approved the revised DPR for project cost of Rs.3647.58 lakh and ACA of Rs.1276.64 lakh and directed the State Govt. to return the excess amount already released as ACA towards original DPR along with interest that will be conveyed by Ministry of Finance. The CSMC also decided that the amount of balance ACA as a result of revision of cost may be examined on file taking into account the amount to be set aside for capacity building.

IV. Maharashtra

1. Pune- Release of 3rd instalment for Sewerage system, Phase -II

The CSMC approved the release of 3rd instalment of ACA in respect of the above project as detailed below:

2. Pimpri-Chinchwad-

Revision of DPR on of Water Supply Phase-II for PCMC and release of 2nd and 3rd instalments of ACA

It was noted that DPR on of Water Supply Phase-II for PCMC was approved on 14.1.2009 for total cost of Rs. 14008.81 lakhs and Central assistance of Rs.7004.41 Lakhs of which Rs. 1751.10 Lakhs has been released as 1st instalment.

PCMC proposed to revise the project by deleting two service reservoirs at two places and reorganizing the approved water supply network due to litigation and non-availability of lands at the originally proposed site/routes. PCMC explained that the proposed changes will not compromise the service delivery scope envisaged in the original DPR.

CPHEEO recommended the proposed changes as there are no hydraulic changes and service delivery ramifications. The revised project may be treated as technically appraised at a cost of Rs. 14246.15 lakhs which is to be considered for funding by PCMC and Govt. of Maharashtra. The cost eligible for funding as derived by least cost exposure method is Rs. 13511.82 lakhs which will be the revised approved cost of the project for availing of ACA under JNNURM. However, the revised cost and the revised financing parameters have to be ratified by the CSMC.

The CSMC approved the proposed changes in the DPR with revised cost recommended by CPHEEO and release of 2nd and 3rd instalments of ACA as detailed below:

V. Funding of buses under JnNURM Himachal Pradesh

Shimla- Release of 2nd instalment

A proposal for release of second instalment for funding of buses was taken up for consideration of CSMC as per the phase II DPR by Govt. of Himachal Pradesh along with the UC submitted for the first instalment. OSD (UT) mentioned that a total of 75 number mini/midi buses were sanctioned for Shimla and all 75 buses have been supplied and are running in the city. As per the scheme guidelines 50% of the Central Financial Assistance for the buses was released in the first instalment and the states are entitled for release of second instalment that is 40% of the ACA admissible ease to be released upon receipt of UC to the extent of 70% of the grants (Central and State) and subject to route permission from competent Transport Authority, operation tie ups and loans tie up. There were some more conditions for sanction as per the scheme. The State Government has already set up Shimla Urban Transport Management Society (SUTMS) for controlling and managing city bus service. The operations and maintenance are being conducted by Himachal Road Transport Corporation (HRTC). However, there is no agreement so far between SUTMS and HRTC defining the Service Level Benchmarks which needs to be done before the release of the last instalment.

The ITS facilities including Common Mobility Card as per JnNURM Bus Specification are also been provided on the buses. The Parking policy and Advertisement policy is also under finalisation and is expected to finalised by November 2010. The total cost of the project including the Smart Card based ticketing system is as follows:

VI Proposals for Hand-holding support for implementation of reforms of Himachal Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Goa, Uttar Pradesh, Mizoram and Puducherry

Himachal Pradesh - CSMC decided that though proposal is not in line with the guidelines issued and the State wants implementation support, which is beyond the scope of handholding, in principle approval is given for handholding support as many reforms are pending in the State.

Chhattisgarh- CSMC decided that since the State has not achieved Property tax(90% collection), in principle approval is given for hand holding support for Property tax (90% collection). In principle approval may also be accorded for handholding support for the reforms relating to User Charge Policy.

Goa- The CSMC accorded in principle approval for handholding support as per the guidelines.

Uttar Pradesh- CSMC noted that as per guidelines, there is no handholding support available for Property title certification, however, in principle approval can be given for hand holding support for building bye laws, administrative and structural reforms and PPP.

- Mizoram CSMC noted that under ADB supported NERUDP, the capital cities of North East States are getting support for the implementation of reforms such as 74th Constitutional Amendment Act, water supply and sewerage, double entry accounting and property tax. Therefore, hand holding support is not required for property tax reform.
- Puducherry Since 15 reforms are pending out of 22, CSMC decided to accord in principle approval for hand holding support for the three reforms on Shift to accrual based accounting, Administrative and Structural reforms.

The CSMC suggested that in case any State requires training to implement the reforms they can access the service under capacity building programme.

The meeting ended with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

MINUTES OF 92ND CSMS HELD ON 20.12.2010

The 92nd CSMC was held on 20.12.2010 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (UD), Government of India. The list of participants is annexed.

At the outset, Secretary (UD) and Chairman of CSMC apprised the participants of the Govt. of India's decision regarding sanctioning of new projects and release of instalment for on-going projects. He stated that as mandated by the Cabinet Committee on Infrastructure (CCI), States/ULEs that are not achieving the reforms that are not complex in nature, may rot be considered for sanction of new projects. In case of UIG projects where significant progress has been made in the implementation of reforms by the States/cities, ACA may be released after withholding 10% of the Central share. States may use their own funds to meet the balance amount and complete the ongoing projects and obtain reimbursement of the withheld amount on completion of reforms. It was explained that there are 7 reforms which are complex; in addition, one out of two parts of two reforms and 2 out of three parts another reform also complex. Thus 8.7 reforms are complex and 14.3 forms are non-complex. If 10 points are given for achievement of each non-complex reform, the maximum points which can be achieved over a period of 7 years is 143 and when completed for 5 years period, the maximum points can be achieved is 102.14 points. If a formula of 70% is kept as qualifying for significant achievement, the city must obtain 71.5 points minimum. In case it obtains less than 71.5 points, the performance in terms of non-complex reforms may be taken into account by the CSMC for decision regarding significant progress. The CSMC decided that States/ULBs that meet the above criterion will be eligible for claiming further instalments ACA for on-going projects.

The CSMC then considered the following proposals:

1. Uttar Pradesh

Kanpur- State-wide Computerized Administration of Local Entities (UPSCALE)

The proposal of UP Government for State Level Software solution at Kanpur ULB was discussed in the 89th CSMC held on 20.8.2010. It was observed that the appraised cost at Rs.28.07 crore was on the higher side, particularly the funds earmarked for capacity building. It was also indicated that the admissibility of certain costs towards GIS and GPRS tracking devices may be re-looked at as per NMMP guidelines. CSMC had directed that PMU and DIT would re-examine the cost and the vetted cost would be taken as approved cost of the project.

Representatives of Department of Information Technology (DIT) and PMU stated that the cost of the project has been re-examined as directed by CSMC. The revised cost has been worked out after excluding GIS and GPRS tracking components for implementation of e-Governance at Rs.2361.79 lakh. Joint Secretary (Mission) stated that the cost of analysis done by PMU seems reasonable as now GIS 7 GPRS are excluded- GPRS may come as part of SWM project and GIS should be coordinated by State Govt. as it is also being undertaken by other departments of the State Govt.

CSMC approved the Uttar Pradesh State-wide Computerized Administration of Local Entities (UPSCALE) project for Rs.2361.79 lakh under 5% capacity building funds of JNNURM and the conditionalities of DIT and PMU indicated in the appraisal notes. The first instalment of ACA would be released after signing of tripartite agreement between the Sate Govt. of Uttar Pradesh, ULB of Lucknow and GOI. The financial parameters of the project would be as under:

1. Gujarat

Porbandar- Augmentation of Water Supply for Porbandar (New project)

Project Rationale- Presently, the water supply service in Porbandar Municipality covers all the 15 wards. But at the household level, only about 60% of households have direct connections. Rest of the houses and all slums households are catered to through public stand posts. Present daily supply is about 22.68 MLD for an estimated population of 168000. The per capita water availability works out to 87 LPCD considering 35% system losses against the norm of 135 LPCD to be delivered. The main constraints are weak distribution system, lack of adequate storage facility in the service areas, large dependency on public taps, absence of metering, existence of old areas, large dependency on public taps, absence of metering, existence of old areas in the network registering frequent leaks & breakage. The proposed DPR has been prepared for providing comprehensive water supply system with required infrastructure for the conveyance, pumping, storage and distribution aimed at achieving 100% household connectivity. After and distribution aimed at achieving 100% household connectivity will be implementation of the project the whole of Porbandar Municipality will be covered with comprehensive water supply with metering system.

The Purbandar ULB and State Govt. committed to implementing volumetric tariff and implementation of water supply on 24X7 pattern, with 100% coverage and 100% metering.

Project cost and implementation period. The project will be implemented by Porbandar Municipality at an appraised cost of Rs.2631.04 lakh. The implementation period indicated in the DPR is 24 months. However, implementation period indicated in the DPR is 24 months by CPHEEO suggested that the project should be completed in 16 months by March, 2012 in view of JNNURM closure date.

The CSMC approved the project subject to the above conditions and the conditionalities indicated in the CPHEEO's appraisal note as under:

MINUTES OF 93rd CSMC HELD ON 17-18 February, 2011

The 93rd CSMC was held on 17-18 February, 2011 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (UD), Government of India. The list of participants is annexed.

The CSMC considered the following proposals:

1. New Projects

West Bengal

Kolkata

1.1) Improvement of Upper Bagjola Canal within Kolkata Urban Agglomeration.

Project Rationale-The Bagjola Canal is one of the most important canals on the Kolkata Metropolitan Area and is divided into two parts: the Upper Bagjola Canal and the Lower Bagjola Canal The Upper Bagjola Canal is the main existing drainage channel that takes up storm water flow from the urban areas of Panihati, North and South Dum Dum and adjoining Kolkata Municipal Areas. The carrying capacity and the flow of the canal has deteriorated in course of time due to siltation, deposition of solid waste and khatal effluents at places, and is unable to cater the storm water discharge congestion in the adjoining basins of the upper parts of the canal.

The present DPR has been prepared to mitigate the storm water congestion and water logging in the affected areas of Panihati, Kamarahati, Barangar, North and South Dum Dum Municipalities within Kolkata UA.

The project consists of the following works:

- De-siltation of the canal and lining of banks.
- Re-excavation and lining both side slopes of the canal
- · Formation of a railway crossing structure along with construction of one diversion channel
- Increasing the ventage area of cross regulator below VIP road.

The project will be implemented by the Irrigation & Waterways Department, Govt. of West Bengal. The annual O&M cost estimated to Rs.317.00 lakh to be met by the Irrigation & Waterways Department. No user charges can be imposed as storm water drainage is a non point source.

Issues discussed: The representative of Department of Expenditure enquired as to whether any understanding has been reached between the concerned agencies regarding de-siltation. ULB clarified that Irrigation Department has given in writing to manage the de-siltation, and no land acquisition issues are involved. CPHEEO commented that the project is not relating to irrigation, and as such no regulatory issue is involved

ULB stated that the appraisal agency has deleted the maintenance cost of the railway crossing that has be to be paid to Railway Department, and pleaded that the same may be included in the appraised cost. WAPCOS stated that the maintenance cost is not permissible under JNNURM, and accordingly, the same has been deleted from the appraised cost of in the DPR.

CSMC accepted the cost recommended by the appraisal agency. It was also noted that implementation of reforms in the state and ULBs are on time.

1.2) Storm Water Drainage for Baranagar Municipal Area within Kolkata UA.

Project rationale: The Baranagar Municipality experiences water logging during the monsoon affecting the citizens' movements and routine economic activities. The frequent water logging is primarily due to the fact that many wards in Baranagar are yet to be covered with adequate drainage system. The Municipality has only few drains that were constructed during the British period which have become inadequate due to greater urbanization and rapid increase in population density. Therefore, there is an urgent need to provide comprehensive storm water drainage with proper outfall arrangements.

The present DPR proposes comprehensive Storm Water Drainage resizing the existing drains and their integration with new drains including establishing proper outfalls so as to remove the storm water drainage bottleneck within the Municipal area. The proposed DPR covers 9.46 sq. km. (100% of the total road network in the town).

The DPR comprises of covered brick masonry and RCC Project component: surface drains; underground pipe lines with manholes and gulley pits etc.

Project cost and Implementation period: The project will be implemented in 13 months from March, 2011 to March, 2012 at estimated cost of Rs. 3587.39 lakh recommended by CPHEEO.

The CSMC approved the project subject to the conditionalities of appraisal agencies indicated in the appraisal note as under:

1.3) Integrated Solid Waste Management Project for Jumshedpur Urban Agglomeration

Project rational: The population of total Jamshedpur Urban Agglomeration (JUA) as per the census 2001 is close to 11 lakh. In JUA, waste is being handled by the municipal bodies in their respective jurisdiction with a little assistance and support from Local NGOs. Immense problems are being faced by the local bodies in managing the municipal wastes. ULBs in Jamshedpur Urban Agglomeration are outsourcing sanitation work force to operate ULBs own vehicles for collection, transportation and disposal of waste. The present collection efficiency in JUA is very low at about 40 %. The main difficulty is lack of adequate number of bins and collection vehicles and lack of door to door collection. Treatment is non-existent as crude open dumping is being practised. The present SWM system is only skeletal and the JUA is unable to comply with the requirements of MSW Rules 2000. Thus, there is an urgent need to scale up and install all components of SWM infrastructure as per Municipal Solid Waste Management Rules 2000 and to ensure Solid Waste Management in an integrated manner for 100% coverage as per the Service Level Bench Marks formulated & circulated by the Ministry in 2008. JUA is proposing the present DPR to revamp its MSW management in full conformity with the MSW Rules 2000.

Project component- The DPR submitted by JUA proposes to carry out the following SWM activities:

- Organized door to door collection & segregation of waste at source
- Primary Collection & storage of segregated waste
- · Provision of movable covered containers of appropriate design in place of open heaps

Transportation of waste in covered vehicles only

Minimize multiple handling through synchronized bins and transportation

Additional processing facility with multiple product recovery for higher SWM

generation so as to minimize burden on SLF

Disposal of only inerts & process remnants in engineered land fill

Project cost and implementation period- The CPHEEO has appraised the DPR for Rs. 3336.24 Lakhs. The project will be implemented by Jamshedpur /Adityapur Notified Area Committee, and Jamshedpur NAC will be the nodal O&M operator. All ULBs have to execute agreements/ resolutions to this effect. The project will be implemented in 15 months from January 2011 to March 2012, as per JNNURM Closure Date

Issues: It was noted that the MOA with Jamshedpur was signed in October, 2009, and the ULB will get only 3 years for achieving the reforms commitments. Therefore, the principle for assessing significant achievement in the implementation of urban reforms based on numerical marking applied for other ULBs which get 7 years for reforms may not be appropriate. appropriate adjustment is taken into account then the points required to be obtained by Jamshedpur will be 31 and Jamshedpur has 40 points for noncomplex reforms and 10 points for complex reforms- and thus meets the benchmark. Further, the Mission city of Jamshedpur has not yet got a single project under JNNURM. In view of above, the CSMC including the Department of Expenditure and Planning Commission agreed that the new DPR for Jamshedpur may be considered for approval

2.1) Revised DPRs for improvement of junctions in Haridwar city Dehradun city

The DPRs for Improvement of 16 junctions in Haridwar city and Improvement of 30 junctions in Dehradun city were approved by CSMC on 29.12.20008 and 22.1.2009 at cost of Rs.20.05 cr. and Rs.29.43 cr. respectively. Subsequently, the State Govt. submitted revised DPRs reducing the number of junctions and including the cost of land acquisition in the DPRs.

The revised DPRs have been technically recommended by CPWD and IUT. The revised DPRs were discussed in the 88th CSMC held on 23.7.2010, and the CSMC had desired that the State Govt. should provide adequate justification regarding necessity for acquisition of land and rehabilitation cost for consideration of revised DPRs. The Principal Secretary (UD), Govt. of Uttarakhand, vide letter dated 14.12.2010 has clarified that the PWD had prepared the DPRs for improvement of Junctions in Haridwar and Dehradun without mentioning land acquisition in the DRPs as it was presumed at the State level that all lands at the proposed sites belonged to government and the same was stated by the State Govt. at the time of sanctioning of the original DPRs. But during the implementation of the projects, the implementing agency discovered the existence of private lands at various inter junctions which necessitated the need for the land acquisition at those places leading to current compulsion of acquiring of lands and restructuring of existing DPRs.

2.2) Haridwar

Dropping of project namely "Channelization of Escape Channel for Discharge of Surplus Water from Ganga Canal at Chandi Dweep, Haridwar" sanctioned under JNNURM

The DPR for Channelization of Escape Channel for discharge of surplus water from Ganga Canal at Chandi Dweep, Haridwar, was approved in the 84th CSMC held on 21.5.2010 for a project cost of Rs.3974.33 lakh including Central ACA of Rs.3179.46 lakh. The first instalment of ACA amounting to Rs.794.86 lakh has already been released for the project.

Principal Secretary (UD), Govt. of Uttarakhand vide letter dated 14.12.2010 clarified that heavy floods due to excess rains during the current year inundated the project site causing topographical change in the project areas necessitating reexamination of feasibility of the project. The re-examination of the DPR suggests that Channelization of Escape Channel can not be done by erecting barrage which may decrease the river bed causing flood at the down-stream of the barrage affecting the security of life, and it would not be advisable to implement the DPR.

The CCMC considered the proposal of the State Govt. and decided to drop the DPR on Channelization of Escape Channel for Discharge of Surplus Water from Ganga Canal at Chandi Dweep, Haridwar from the list of approved project. The ACA amounting to Rs.794.86 lakh released to the project as first instalment along with interest to be recouped from the State by Department of Expenditure as per existing procedure.

3. Haryana

Faridabad-Proposal for setting up of Independent Review and Monitoring Agency

The CSMC considered the proposal of Govt. of Haryana for appointing M/s Water and Power Consultancy Services (India) Limited as IRMA for the State with the ceining of Rs. 1.5 lakhs per project for the review of project document, and Rs. 0.35 lakhs per visit to the project site.

4. Funds flow mechanism for funding CVTCs in the Mission cities of JNNURM jointly by Ministry of Urban Development and Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation.

Ministry of Urban Development issued revised guidelines for setting up CVTCs in the Mission cities vide letter dated 29.3.2010.

As per para 8 of the said guidelines, assistance will be provided to Mission cities as logistical support for coordinating CVTC activities drawn from 1% capacity building funds under JNNURM to be shared 60:40 by Ministry of Urban Development and Ministry of Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation. The CSMC approved the following funds flow mechanism for funding of CVTS activities in the Mission cities:

1. An amount of 10 lakh per annum per mission city with contribution of Rs.6 lakh from Ministry of Urban Development and Rs.4 lakh from Ministry of

Housing and Urban Poverty Alleviation to be released to NIUA in two equal instalments. NIUA will release the amount to the respective Municipal Corporation.

- 2. The second instalment of funds will be released only after 70% of funds released earlier are fully used by the ULB, subject to compliance with the provisions relating to submission of UCs under the GERs.
- 3. The assistance will be available only to those cities who have already set up CVTCs
- NIUA will keep proper accounts of the funds released to Mission cities for the purpose of Audit at later stage.

5. Release of further instalments of ACA for on-going projects

The CSMC reviewed implementation of urban sector reforms and progress made in execution of projects in the States of Andhra Pradesh, Chhattishgarh, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Tamil Nadu, Uttar Pradesh and West Bengal. As these States have made significant progress in the implementation of urban reforms, the CSMC approved release of further instalments of ACA in respect of ongoing projects as detailed under:

MINUTES OF 94th CSMC HELD ON 25th February, 2011

The 94th CSMC was held on 25th February, 2011 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (UD), Government of India.

The CSMC considered the following proposals:

1. New Projects.

Tamil Nadu

Chennai

1.1) Construction and commissioning of additional 120 MLD sewage Treatment plant at Koyambedu (Phase- II) in Chennai

Project Objective: The proposal envisages treatment of 120 mld of sewage generated from the part of Central Chennai/West Chennai area (Zone-III) and Adjacent urbanized areas (AUAs) such as Maduravoil, Ambattur (part), Nerundram and Nolambur of Chennai city for the design period up to 2022 AD.

Project Rationale: The present realization of sewage flow at Koyambedu STP from the area of Central Chennai /West Chennai City and Adjacent Urbanized areas of Ambattur & Mogappair are about 98mld. The sewerage schemes except STPs of adjacent urbanized areas like Maduravoil, Ambattur (part), Nerkundram and Nolambur of Chennai city are getting implemented under JNNURM. In addition to sewage generated from the present population of Central Chennai & West Chennai City and Adjacent Urbanized areas of Ambattur & Mogappair, it is proposed to convey the 120 mld of sewage to be generated by the year 2022 from central Chennai & west Chennai area (56.35mld) and Adjacent urbanized areas like Maduravoil, Ambattur (part), Nerkundram and Nolambur of Chennai city, (63.3 mld) to this plant. Thus, the total estimated sewage to be generated from the above areas is 213.65 mld (2022 AD). The existing available treatment capacity at Koyambedu is 94 mld. Hence an additional 120 mld sewage treatment plant is needed to treat the sewage (2022) to meet the effluent standards.

Project Cost and Implementation period: The project will be implemented in 27 months from February 2011 (24 months for construction + 3 Months for running maintenance for stabilization of the plant.). **MD. CMWSSB vide his letter dated 14.02.2011 has given an undertaking to put best efforts to complete the project by 31.03.2011. The appraised cost of the project is Rs. 11610.00 lakh as recommended by CPHEEO, the appraisal agency.**



SEWERAGE SYSTEMS IN CHENNAL CITY












KOYAMBEDU 120 MLD ADDITIONAL STP – ACTIVATED SLUDGE PROCESS FLOW DIAGRAM

Tenders were called package wise for all the valleys and works were executed partially. The implementation was constrained due to: Delay in removal of encroachments, Insufficient land for widening, Bed deepening and bed protection works could not be taken up due to entry of continuous sewage flow in storm water drains, Shifting of service lines laid inside/across SWD not done, Lack of access / approach to work site along side SWD for conveyance of construction materials at site, Lack of coordination between line departments, Non performance of contractors as per work program, Non availability of permission from traffic police department to take up remodeling of culverts/bridges in busy and congested areas, Incessant rains disturbing the work hence resulting in delay in execution.

In addition to the components approved in original DPR by CSMC, some of the additional components such as Box type drains (closed sections) to use as road/pavement, Ushaped drains where the abutting residential buildings cannot be removed ,Ogee weir to reduce the velocities, RCC pre cast hollow box retaining walls were undertaken by BBMP

A need was felt to revise the DPR on account of - Modification of Designs due to changed site conditions, Additional component of works such as box type drains, U-shaped drains, Ogee weir etc. as per site conditions., Deletion of components such as detention ponds, Construction of wells with Pumping arrangements etc., Execution of additional quantity of approved components as per site requirements, such as chain link fencing, reconstruction of walls etc., Some of the item of works not executed as per prevailing site conditions, such as bed protection, restoration of walls etc.

While preparing the Revised DPR, the Design Parameters which were approved by the CPHEEO are adopted and the Design parameter for Storm Water frequency is taken as two years uniformly and is followed as per the guidelines of CPHEEO. The revised projects are to be completed within 24 months from the date of approval.

Minutes of the 96th CSMC Meeting for UIG Component of JnNURM held at 3.00 pm on 25th March., 2011

The 96^{th} CSMC Meeting was held on 25.03.2011 under the Chairmanship of Secretary (Urban Development), Govt. of India. The list of participants is annexed.

Approval of new projects

A. <u>Uttarakhand</u>: The Representative from the State made a brief presentation on the implementation of the Reforms in the State. The city of Hardwar is yet to utilize the additional ACA allocated to it and has proposed two sewerage projects which will serve the areas which are not covered presently by the sewer network.

Project Rationale: The city of Hardwar has 145 km of sewer line along with 16 sewage pumping stations. It has three STPs with a total treatment capacity of 53 MLD. The sewerage system of the city has been divided into six zones taking into consideration the uneven topography of the town. Out of the 13.86 sq. km area, 11.76 sq. km area is already covered by sewer network. The remaining 1.90 sq. km area is proposed to be covered through these two projects under JnNURM. Further 2 STPs with a total capacity of 27 MLD are also proposed to be taken up under NGRBA.

The projects are to be completed by March 2012.

III. Proposal for approval of Revised DPR for the project - BRTS Project of Vijayawada

BRTS project for the city was approved at a cost of 15264.00 lakh in the 28th CSMC meeting held on 26th March, 2007. The original DPR envisaged a 15.5 km corridor @ Rs.8.8 crore/km with an

additional Rs. 3 crore for ITES. Some of the work envisaged in the DPR has been already taken up by State's R & B dept. and National Highways. This has led to a savings of Rs. 72.84 crore.

The city has submitted a Revised DPR by dropping certain components from the original DPR and adding some new components which include 2.5 km of new stretch. The revised cost of the project as per the appraisal done by CPWD is Rs. 15100.00 lakh.

However it was found that there is no clarity with respect to the exact length of the corridor to be taken up under JnNURM and the cost thereof.

CSMC approved the proposal in principle subject to reappraisal of the Revised DPR by CPWD to work out the details of the components to be taken up under JnNURM and its cost.

IV. Proposal for extension of PMU to support eGovernance in Mission Cities

The scheme has been widened to include all the 65 cities instead of 35 cities. Hence, CSMC decided to extend the services of PMU to support eGovernance in Mission Cities till 31st March, 2012. Regarding the manpower and the costs, the same will be finalized after the comments are received from DIT.
